Highlights of Population in the Municipality of Monkayo based on the 2020 Census of Population and Housing (2020 CPH)

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Municipality of Monkayo population was recorded at 93,937 persons

The total population of the Municipality of Monkayo as of May 1, 2020 was 93,937 persons based on the 2020 Census of Population and Housing (2020 CPH). It accounted for about 12.2 percent of the Davao de Oro population in 2020.

The population of the municipality for the year 2020 is lower by 971 persons compared with the population of 94,908 in 2015; lower by 890 persons compared with the population of 94,827 in 2010; and higher by 8,107 persons compared with the population of 85,830 in 2000. (see *Table 1*)

The municipality population declined by 0.22 percent

The total population of Monkayo decreased by 0.22 percent annually, on average, during the period of 2015 to 2020. By comparison, the rate at which the municipality population grew during the period of 2010 to 2015 was higher at 0.02 percent (see *Table 2*)

Barangay Poblacion consistently has the biggest population municipalwide

The Municipality of Monkayo has 21 barangays. In 2020, Barangay Poblacion had the biggest population with 20,435 persons residing in the barangay or contributed 21.75 percent out of the total population of the municipality, followed by Barangay Union with 8,316 persons or 8.85 percent and Barangay Casoon with 6,651 persons or 7.08 percent, respectively. (see Table 3)

Barangay San Isidro had the smallest population size with 1,374 persons or accounted for only 1.46 percent of the municipality population, followed by Barangay Inambatan with 1,397 persons or 1.49 percent and Barangay Mamunga with 1,860 persons or 1.98 percent.

Union is the fastest growing barangay

Barangay Union was the fastest growing barangay in the municipality with an average annual population growth rate (PGR) of 21.81 percent during the period of 2015 to 2020. It was followed by Barangay Baylo with a PGR of 5.28 percent, and Barangay Casoon with 3.28 percent. (see Table 4)

On the other hand, Barangay Macopa was the slowest growing barangay with a PGR of 0.03 percent, followed by Barangay Mamunga with PGR of 0.27 percent, and Barangay Tubo-tubo (New Del Monte) with PGR of 0.75 percent. Barangay Pasion (Santa Filomena) population count added only one (1) person from year 2015 to 2020.

Additionally, there were Six (6) barangays that posted a negative PGR. Barangay Mount Diwata posted the highest negative PGR of 19.08 percent, while Barangay San Isidro posted the lowest negative PGR of 0.41 percent, respectively. Barangay Mount Diwata had a consistent negative PGR since year 2010 up to present.

TECHNICAL NOTES

- The 2020 CPH was undertaken by the Philippine Statistics Authority in September 2020 pursuant to Republic Act No. 10625, also known as the Philippine Statistical Act of 2013 and B.P. Blg. 72 further accorded the PSA the authority to conduct population censuses every ten (10) years beginning in 1980.
- Information on the count of the population were collected with 12:01 a.m. of May 1, 2020 as the census reference time and date.
- The 2020 CPH is the country's 15th Census of Population and 7th Census of Housing since 1903.
- Doubling **time** is the amount of time it takes for a given quantity to double in size or value at a constant growth rate. We can find the doubling time for a population undergoing exponential growth by using the **Rule of 70**. To compute for doubling time, we divide 70 by the growth rate (r).
- His Excellency President Rodrigo R. Duterte declared as official for all purposes the population counts by province, city/municipality, and barangay, based on the 2020 CPH under Proclamation No. 1179 dated 06 July 2021. The population counts were based on census questionnaires accomplished by about 90,000 enumerators deployed during the nationwide census taking.
- The successful completion of the census-taking was made possible with the support of the local and national officials, government agencies, local government units, media, private agencies, and non-government organizations.
